#### Quran Teaching on How Muslims Should Treat Non-Muslims. (a) 1

#### Meaures Taken by Kenyan Muslims to Ensure the Ouran Remains in Its Original (b) Form.

The Quran is recited during prayers and any mistakes detected are corrected. (i)

It is applied in Sharia hence the teachings are adhered to. (ii)

It has been memorised by many people. (iii)

(iv) It is recited in its original language - Arabic.

- Translation (in English and Kiswahili) has an Arabic version besides them. (v)
- (vi) The science of translation of the Quran lays emphasis on the correct pronunciation of words.
- Quotation from the Quran must be accurate and correct in their original form. (vii)

(viii) ' Paraphrasing of the Quran is not allowed.

- The Quran is taught in Madrassa and in duksil (reading and recitation). (ix)
- (x) Muslims organise Quran recitation competitions. This is done by organisations or in Mosques.
- Recorded in audio-visual cassettes for Muslims to listen and learn the correct (xi) pronunciations.
- Recited during the month of Ramadhan and during Muslim festivals. (xii)

#### (a) Pactors Which Helped the Companions of the Prophet to Spread the Sunnah of the Prophet.

There was love for the Prophet and commitment to his mission. (i) (ii)

They had receptive brains and good memories. (iii)

- They were promised rewards in the hereafter for imparting knowledge. (iv)
- Their close interaction with the Prophet helped them to learn many traditions. (v) They had very few worldly pleasures so they dedicated their time to spreading

(vi) the desire to go to heaven inspired them. (VII)

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They themselves practised the Sunnah of the Prophet. (viii)

They recorded the hadith of the Prophet which they used to reach others.

### Reasons Why it Became Necessary to Collect and Compile Hadith. (b)

- The fear of the purity of the Quran being interfered with had subsided because (i) the Quran had already been written.
- Many memorisers of hadith were dying thus there was need to collect and (ii) compile hadith so as to preserve it.
- Invention of the false hadith which threatened the purity of hadith. It was (iii) therefore necessary to collect and compile hadith so as to differentiate between false and authentic hadith.
- Expansion of the Muslim empire brought in new people/communities who (iv) needed the knowledge of hadith.
- Leaders required the knowledge of hadith so as to be effective and efficient in (v) administration.
- It was necessary to collect and compile hadith for future generations/ for (vi) posterity.
- The importance of hadith as the second source of Sharia necessitated its (vii) collection and compilation.
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## Qualities of Muhaddith.

- Thorough knowledge of the Quran.
- (i) Ability to differentiate between sound and weak hadith.
- Should be of unquestionable character/trustworthy/of high personal integrity. (ii) (iii)
- Should be of sound memory.
- Should have thorough knowledge of hadith/scholar of hadith. (iv)

- Should have knowledge of biographies of hadith narrators.

#### Types of Hail. 3a

- Hajj al-Qiraan both the Umrah and Hajj are performed while in the same state-(i)
- Hajj al-Tamat to perform Umrah during the month of Hajj and release the Ihram. Thereafter the pilgrim performs Hajj the same year without leaving the (ii)
- Ifraad bil-Hajj Hajj without Umrah. The pilgrim called mufrid enters the state of Ihram with the intent of performing Hajj only. (i)

### Social Benefits of Performing Haij. h

- While on hajj, a person exercises self-control over passions, gossip, dishonesty, (i)
- Meeting Muslims from other lands/countries/nations, help one to develop/feel a (i)

- People from different continents and countries and from all walks of life meet exchange ideas, share experiences and get to know each others' problems. (111) exchange ideas, share experience as all people come together to perform
- (iv) the rituals of haii. Wearing of Ihram by all pilgrims is a sign and act of equality among Muslims
- By casting off/away clothes in favour of Ihram makes one forego his ego, (1) During hajj a person foregoes the normal comforts of life which helps one to (117)
- appreciate the hardships of life/plight of those who suffer hardships. (vin Performance of hajj facilitates the realisation of unity among Muslims.
- Develops in the pilgrim a sense of responsibility towards others. (viii)

#### Conditions to Fulfil in Order to Perform Haij. (C)

- One must be a Muslim. (i)
- Must be mentally fit/sound. (ii)
- Must be mature. (iii)
- Must be a free person. (iv)
- Must have enough provisions for the dependants i.e. children for the duration of (v) one's absence.
- Ensure the security of the route. (vi)
- Must bid farewell to friends and relatives, ask for forgiveness in case a person (vii) had wronged them and ask for their blessings.
- Must pay all the debts. (viii)
- Should not be involved in any unlawful acts during preparation for hajj. (ix)
- Must be in a position to finance the haij. (x)
- A woman must be accompanied by her husband or a Mahram. (xi)

#### 4a Islamic Teachings on the Bellef in Oadar.

- Nothing good or bad happens except by Allah's will. (i)
- Human beings have been given free will to choose between right and wrong the (ii) are responsible for their deeds.
- Human beings shall be accountable for their deeds on the day of judgement (iii)
- Allah is supreme and powerful and no events take place without His knowledge. (iv)
- Qadar promotes contentment and patience among believers. (v)
- (VI) Belief in Qadar ensures our faith in the divine will and makes us seek His guidance in all our deeds.
- Nothing occurs without Allah's power; for anything to happen, Allah must will it to happen e.g. movement of (vii) to happen e.g. movement of sun, moon, earth functioning of a person's body, etc.

### Muslim Beliefs about Yawmul Qivamah. (b)

- All lives will be destroyed. (i)
- The knowledge of the last hour in only with Allah. (ii)
- Only Allah will exist on that day, (iii)
- Angel Israfil will be ordered to blow the trumpet. (iv)
- All the dead will be brought back to life. (v)
- People will assemble before Allah. (vi)
- People will be in a confused state. (vii)
- People will be given books showing their deeds. (viii)
- All people will face final judgement either to go to hell or paradise. (ix)

#### Muslim Beliefs About Prophet Muhammed. (c)

- He is the last of Allah's prophets/seal of the prophets. (i)
- (ii) He is Ma'sum.
- (iii) The Quran was revealed to him.
- He is a messenger of Allah. (iv)
- He will be allowed to intercede on behalf of his ummah on the Day of (v) Judgement.
- (vi) He was a human being/ideal man who passed through all the stages of life.
- (vii) He was exemplary/lived exemplary life/model for humankind to emulate.

### Conditions for Marriage to be Considered Valid.

The girl to be married must give her consent. (i)

- The guardian of the girl must also consent to the marriage. If the guardian (ii) refuses without a valid reason then the kadhi can give the consent.
- There must be witnesses when marriage is taking place. (iii)
- The man marrying must be doing so willingly. (iv)
- Marriage must not be between two people who are forbidden by shariah to (v)
- Dowry must be given to the girl. (vi)

#### (b) Islamic Teachings on Treatment of Orphans.

- Should be taken care of by Muslim community. (i)
- Their property should be restored back to them when they reach maturity. (ii)
- The guardian should not substitute their wealth with his/hers. (iii)
- If there is any profit from the wealth, it should be restored back to them. (iv)
- The guardians are allowed to use their wealth if he is poor but not extravagantly. (v)
- There must be witnesses when returning their wealth. (vi)
- The community should treat orphans with kindness/compassion. (vii)
- The community should give them refuge. (viii)
- The guardian should not use the orphan's wealth unless it is absolutely (ix)

### (c) Reasons Why Pride is Discouraged in Islam.

- (i) Allah does not like proud people.
- (ii) A proud person will not earn Allah's blessings.
- (iii) A proud person shall not enter paradise.
- (iv) Pride brings about bad relationships among people.
- (v) Pride creates hatred as a proud person is detested.
- (vi) It is a quality of Shaitan. Shaitan was thrown out of heaven because of pride.
- (vii) Pride can reduce a person's intellect and regard/respect for others.
- (viii) Pride leads to selfishness and greed.
- (ix) Pride can lead to self-destruction.

## 6(a) Causes of the Decline of the Ummavad Dynasty.

- Disorganisation The Ummayads were not well organised in their administation of the vast empire.
- (ii) Harsh rule Due to their harsh rule and negligence of their duties and responsibilities they lost respect and confidence from the Muslims.
- (iii) Internal strife due to differences between Arabs and non-Arabs. Also the Mawali and underprivileged Arabs hated the Ummayad rule and revolted against them.
- (iv) Failure to maintain a standing army contributed to the decline of the empire.
- (v) The failures and weakness of the Ummayad favoured the new emerging group of Abbasids.
- (vi) The propaganda carried out by Muhammad the grandson of Abbas also helped to bring down the Ummayads.
- (vii) Due to the vastness of the empire, some governors ignored the central government's directives and policies.
- (viii) Heavy taxation of the subjects made them disatisfied and unsupportive of the Ummayad rule.
- (ix) There were constant revolts e.g. in Egypt and Hijaz and the Kharijites saw the Ummayad as imposters who had usurped the power of the rightly guided Khalifas.
- (x) The empire ceased to be ruled according to Islamic principles and this made
- (xi) The Dhims felt oppressed and were ready to help any group that could bring an end to the Ummayad dynasty.

## (b) Wavs in Which Islam is Spreading in East Africa.

- (i) Through the construction of mosques and madrassa in different places.
- (ii) Through the work of Muslim preachers (tablingh).
- (iii) Public debates.
- (iv) Through the mass media/print and electronic media.
- (v) Through migration and settlement of Muslims in different areas e.g. rural-urban, urban-urban migration, rural-rural migration or urban-rural migration.
- (vi) Through intermarriages.
- (vii) Urbanisation some people convert to Islam when they move to urban areas where Islam is prevalent.
- (viii) Through the work of Muslim organisations e.g. charitable organisation.
- (ix) Islamic culture and etiquette continue to draw people to Islam.
