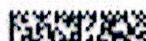

Read the passage below and then answer the questions that follow.

(20 marks)

Somebody once said that one is never lonely when one is alone. Most people, however, are terrified of leaving home. They are used to living with others- children with parents, roommates with roommates, friends with friends and husbands with wives. When, therefore, they are thrust into a situation where they have to live alone, they feel like a **fish out of water**.

Chances are high that most adult men and women will need to know how to live alone at some point in their lives. For some, it will be for a short period but for others it will be for much longer.

But what kind of circumstances lead to this situation, which to most people is undesirable? Take college students for example. There are many who are day scholars and it may not always be easy for them to find a **compatible** roommate.

Also, when most young people begin working, they find it necessary, or are gently **nudged** by parents, to leave the nest. We must also not forget the unfortunate scenario where married couples are separated by death, divorce or even by the demands of their jobs.

One recommended way to prepare for living alone is to learn how to take care of practical matters. For example, some students, especially some males, cannot fix a meal for themselves. Similarly, there are married people who have always relied on their spouses to make major decisions like buying a vehicle or land. It is only after such people accept that they are now on their own and life must go on that they discover they are not helpless. Some realise that they can do far better than the people they previously relied on.

Finding yourself alone can also give you the opportunity to form new friendships. But this can only happen if you feel self-reliant. No doubt you know students who are in the habit of always going to class with a friend. When they break this dependency, they are pleasantly surprised to find that they are able to concentrate better and also to make new friends.

Probably the most difficult problem for people living alone is dealing with feelings of loneliness. First, they have to understand the feeling. Some people confuse being alone with being lonely. They need to remember that it is possible to feel lonely in a room crowded with friends. Second, those living alone must fight any tendencies to get depressed. Depression can lead to a lot of unhappiness. Third, people living alone should get involved in useful and pleasurable activities such as helping others.

Whoever you are, ask yourself, "If I had to live alone starting tomorrow morning, would I know how?" If the answer is "No", you need to become conscious of what living alone calls for.
